From the Principal

Dear Parents,

Greet them with a Smile , Not a Mobile Greeting your child at the end of a school day is one of the most important times to build up a relationship and find out how their busy day went at school. So when you do this we recommend that you 'greet your child with a smile, and not a mobile.'

Your children can be full of stories of the many wonderful and interesting things they did at school that day but it is important that you are ready to greet them with your full attention and not sharing them with your phone.

Talking about school with your child is important. It shows you're interested in your child's life and value education. Talking together about school also helps you get to know more about what's expected of your child at school, how she or he learns and how they handle the many challenges they come across each day.

Simple, positive and specific questions about parts of the day can get your child talking and avoids the 'yes – no answer. For example you might want to try a few of these:

- What's the news from school today?
- What was fun?
- What did you like best at school today?
- What does your classroom look like at the moment?
- Who did you hang out with today?
- What subjects did you do today?
- What projects are you working on at the moment?

We are always trying to develop the speaking and listening skills of our children in school and you can greatly assist and extend these skills by just being there with your full attention so when picking up or greeting your child this week remember to 'greet your child with a smile, not a mobile.'

Building Update The fences are down, the huts have been removed and the builders have left. After 14 long months of disruptions and inconveniences due to building works, we have a new look school and all of our school grounds have been returned to us.

The school still has a considerable amount of 'fitting out' of the new buildings with the installation of extra pin-boards, shelving, storage, air-conditioning etc. which were not included in the scope of the works. These will occur in stages over the next 6 months.

The portable toilet blocks near the multi-purpose room will still remain, possibly until the holidays when they can be removed safely from the grounds.

The school council Facilities & Management Sub-Committee are presently working with a landscape designer in the development of a masterplan for the school grounds. When the concept design is completed, parents will be asked to have their input and give feedback to school council on the design.

It certainly is an exciting time for our school and it will be wonderful to see the landscaping works undertaken this year to completely finish the project and give our community a 21st century school for the teaching and learning of our children.

2018 Annual Report to the School Community The annual report to the school community (Annual report) provides school principals and school councils with an opportunity to share the year's (2018) achievements and progress with the school community and reflect on the school's performance and how improvement efforts have impacted on student outcomes.

The 2018 Annual Report will be presented to the school community at an open meeting prior to the upcoming school council meeting, next Monday 18th March. All members of the school community are invited to attend the presentation and are welcome to remain to observe the March meeting of the school council.

The presentation of the 2018 Annual Report to the School Community will be conducted in the school's staff room beginning at 6.00pm.

Parking Around The School The school will continue to work with the Hobsons Bay Council on improving the parking and traffic management around our local streets. Last year we introduced the very successful 'Pick up & Drop off only' zones outside the school entrances in Elizabeth and Ross St. with the distinguishable blue lines and new signage.

In these areas 'No Parking' means that you can stop your car and get out to help your kids in and out of the car (and kiss them goodbye – if they let you). However, the driver cannot move more than 3 metres from the car. In most instances this will allow you to help them onto the adjacent footpath, but no further.



Generally, No Parking signs don't have a specified time on them. In this case, the Road Rules allow you to stop for up to 2 minutes, and 2 minutes ONLY. Any longer and you can be fined and you are taking up a parking space for another parent to drop off/ pick up their child. By having a different line colouring, it is believed that this will make it easier for drivers to distinguish these parking areas. Please make it easier for everyone by abiding with these important traffic management rules.

School Council strongly recommends when picking up your child from school, park in one of the surrounding side streets, walk a few minutes to school, pick up your child upon dismissal (with a smile) and then enjoy a casual walk back to your car and have a talk with them about their day at school. This is far more relaxing, much more rewarding and keeps you out of the 'traffic chaos' around the school.

Prep Picnic This evening we have the traditional 'Prep Picnic' to welcome all our Prep children and their families to our school. The Prep teachers, Janet, the Office staff and myself will all be on BBQ duty and look forward to meeting all our parents. The evening begins at 5.30pm on the basketball court / outdoor stage area.

Other ribbon winners on the day were Phoebe G finishing in third place in the 50m freestyle. Our 9/10 boys freestyle relay team (Lucas N, Lucas A, Thomas M and Cruz M) finished second. Our 12 girls freestyle relay team (Phoebe G, Poppy W, Grace A and Henrietta L) finished third, as did our girls medley relay team (Jane Z, Phoebe G, Henrietta L and Bridie M).

Congratulations to all of the students who participated on the day. They were wonderful representatives of the school, swam well and had a lot of fun. Thanks also to the parents who came out to support our swimmers, and in particular to David Wetzler who volunteered as timekeeper throughout the day.

Being a member of Newport Lakes School Council is a rewarding way to be involved with the school and the community.

The NLPS Council is made up of parents and staff and meets twice per term. Elections are held at the start of each year and each sitting member serves a term of two years.

Our School Council plays a key role at NLPS, supporting our principal to provide the best possible educational outcomes for the students. All Government schools in Victoria have a school council, which is a legal entity, responsible for:

- Establishing the broad direction and vision of the school within the school's community
- Participating in the development and monitoring of the school strategic plan
- Approving the annual budget and monitoring expenditure
- Developing, reviewing and updating school policies
- Raising funds for school-related purposes
- Maintaining the school's grounds and facilities
- Reporting annually to the school community and to the Department
- Creating interest in the school in the wider community
- Informing itself of and taking into account the views of the community
- Coordinating and assisting with the major community events and activities
- Regulating and facilitating the after-hours use of school premises and grounds

Each member of the school council is expected to be an active member of a Sub-committee. There is also an option for members of the wider school community who may have relevant skills or experience to join the sub-committees. School council **do not** manage the day to day running of the school – that job is reserved for the school principal!

Ann-Maree Dawson: Grade 5/6 Teacher (Community/fundraising committee) in order to look at how the school fosters relationships with its community.



Ban on smoking at childcare centres, kindergartens, preschools and schools

Factsheet for visitors


By law, smoking is banned within the grounds of, and within four metres of an entrance to, all childcare centres, kindergartens, preschools and schools.¹

Where does the ban apply?

Smoking is banned within the grounds of all Victorian childcare centres, kindergartens, preschools and primary and secondary schools in Victoria. This includes all Government, independent and Catholic schools.


Smoking is also banned within four metres of all entrances (pedestrian access points)² to the premises.

The diagram below shows an example of where the smoking ban applies at a childcare centre.

When does the ban apply?

Childcare centres, kindergartens and preschools

The smoking ban applies to childcare, kindergarten and preschools while they are being used to provide a children's service.

Schools

The smoking ban applies at primary and secondary schools at all times, no matter whether the building or school grounds are being used for education purposes or other purposes. The ban therefore applies when other activities are taking place on the school grounds, such as fetes or sporting events, as well as during school hours.

How will people know about the ban?

Signs will be displayed in the smoke-free area.

² A pedestrian access point in relation to premises is defined in the *Tobacco Act 1987* as a door or gate by which a pedestrian can enter or exit the premises.

Why does the ban exist?

To protect children and young people from the dangers of second-hand smoke

This ban ensures that children and young people can enter and leave these areas without being exposed to harmful second-hand smoke.

Second-hand tobacco smoke is particularly dangerous to children and young people because they have smaller airways and less developed immune systems compared to adults.

To reduce the role modelling of smoking behaviours around children and young people

Children and young people are more likely to view smoking as socially acceptable when they regularly see people smoking.

Banning smoking in areas used by children and young people will help to normalise smoking behaviour and discourage children and young people from taking up smoking.

Where does the ban not apply?

The ban does not apply:

- to private homes that provide family day care services
- to an emergency exit that is locked to entry
- to a person walking through the smoke-free area
- to a person in a motor vehicle that is driving or being driven through the smoke-free area
- to a person in an area that is separated from the smoke-free area by a road
- to a person in an outdoor drinking area located within the smoke-free area
- to a person at a residential premises (at privately owned homes and land).

How will the ban be enforced?

There is strong community support for banning smoking at public places regularly attended by children. This means most people will voluntarily comply with the smoking ban and expect others to do so.

Inspectors authorised under the *Tobacco Act 1987* may provide information about and, when necessary, enforce the ban. The first priority of the inspector is to make sure smokers understand the ban.

Inspectors may not be available to respond to every complaint, but where circumstances allow, may attend in response.

What penalties might apply?

The maximum penalty for someone breaking these laws is five penalty units, with an infringement penalty of one penalty unit.

As of 1 July 2017, a penalty unit is valued at \$158.57.³


